Hi Susan,

There are 3 key points here.

- 1. Not always, but the vast majority of the time, the guideline/rule of 22 (20 + 2) works on deciding whether to open or not. You have 8 (5 clubs + 3 spades) cards in your two longest suits + 12 hcp = 20. You have 2 quick tricks with the AK of spades. That's the 20 + 2 telling you that you should open. This is true in any position.
- 2. When your hcp + number of spades = 15, you should open in 4th position. <u>Rule of 15 (Cassino Points, Pearson Points)</u>: <u>Bridge Bidding (bridgehands.com)</u>
- 3. When you have a close bid, and you think the vast majority of the players will make a bid that's one of the choices, bid with the majority. The idea is that you want to avoid really bad boards which can happen when you choose a bid most won't make.

So, you should open this 1C.

Having said that, you were unlucky. A doubleton Q is not worth a full 2 points unless partner has shown values in that suit. Your hcp are in your short suits where they are less valuable than they would be in your long suit. This is a very marginal opener. The main reason I would open it is point #3. Most people will open any 12 hcp hands. They may end up being sorry. But they will have lots of company if they are. By passing, you could have gotten a top or near top, but you risked a bottom or near bottom.

One last thought on opening marginal hands is to consider your opponents. It's generally not a good idea to pass out hands against weak players.
