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Letting the opponents play in a known 8+ card heart fit at the 2 level is almost always wrong. Zia the famous Pakistani bridge champ said that the most important concept in matchpoint bridge is knowing when to push the opponents to the 3 level. At IMPS it's also important but less so, as part scores are less important.

S Pass (I could show a 1 suited hand with my strong hand and nice spade suit, but I make the tactical decision to hope they end up in notrump and I can hopefully run my spades. I don't know East has spades double stopped. They're vul and I don't think we can make game, so I'm hoping to set them for a good score,)

S 2S (I am relatively sure that East has 3+ hearts since I only have 2, and West definitely has 5+ hearts. I'm not defending 2H when I have this spade suit)



Down 2 for 4.9 IMPS.

There's is one lesson from the play. When declarer leads low towards the Q of diamonds, it's important to duck the ace, otherwise declarer will make both the K and Q of diamonds.
